Our Approach

Our Philosophy

Reptile Mineral Resources and Exploration (Pty) Ltd (**RMR** or the **Company**) is a wholly owned subsidiary of Deep Yellow Limited (**Deep Yellow**), an Australian company listed on the Australian and Namibian Stock Exchanges (Code: DYL) and the OTCQX in the United States of America. RMR manages the Namibian arm for the Deep Yellow Group (the **Group**). This includes Reptile Uranium Namibia (Pty) Ltd, holder of ML237 covering the Tumas Project.

The Group demonstrates its commitment to corporate social responsibility (**CSR**) through the active contributions of its representatives at all levels. The Group recognises that, with the head company based overseas in Australia, it is operating in a "visitor" capacity requiring coexistence and mutual respect as key elements of good stakeholder relations. Guided by its Community Relations Policy, the Group aims to balance economic, environmental, and social needs across all phases of project development and operations. The Group finds it rewarding to witness the benefits that arise from diverse projects when they align well with the goals of the host countries.

Namibia

The approach to community investment is aligned with the United Nations (**UN**) Sustainable Development Goals (**SDG**) and Namibia's development plans such as the Fifth National Development Plan (**NDP5**) and the Harambee Prosperity Plan, as shown in Table 1. Formulation of the sixth National Development Plan (**NDP6**) will span two financial years – 2023/2024 to 2024/2025 to allow an extensive participation and consultation process.

The Company endeavours to respond to community needs and requests. Project sponsorships are selected to meet the most urgent needs, as identified through stakeholder interaction and feedback. The focus is on community projects that:


- empower communities through education;
- empower communities through sport; and
- protect the environment.

Governance

Proponents of CSR projects must demonstrate appropriate governance structures and the potential for self-sustainability. All projects undergo a monitoring and review process to ensure integrity and compliance with the Group's Community Relations Policy. The consideration of projects follows a defined procedure, starting with a detailed proposal submitted to RMR management. This proposal outlines the project's background, objectives, budget, and timeline. A review of the recipient's governance and financial processes is conducted before the proposal is evaluated by the Deep Yellow Executive Director. Upon acceptance, the managers of the recipient group receive corporate governance training from the Group. After the completion of a community project, a review is conducted to assess its successes and shortcomings, providing valuable insights for future project implementations.

Pillar Funding

In FY2024, RMR invested N\$461,700 directly into community initiatives. Nova Energy's joint venture with the Japan Organisation for Metals and Energy Security (**JOGMEC**), demonstrated their support for community initiatives by contributing N\$60,000 to selected education projects. In addition to direct expenditure, staff time associated with community activities brought the total investment to N\$817,200.



Community Projects

Empowering Communities Through Educational Support

Namibia faces several challenges in its education system, leading to concerns about the quality of education. RMR is dedicated to improving educational opportunities in Namibia and is actively pursuing new ways to positively impact the community. This section highlights some initiatives undertaken during the reporting period to achieve this overarching goal.

School Needs of the Topnaar Community at Utuseb

An urgent need for school uniforms for 54 students at JP Brand Primary School at Utuseb, within the Walvis Bay Circuit, was identified. RMR's response was swift with a comprehensive set of school uniforms, including shirts, trousers, shoes, jerseys, socks, and school bags, donated to JP Brand Primary School. The total value of the donation amounted to approximately N\$64,000, with N\$55,000 designated for uniforms and N\$9,000 for school bags.

Ms. Josti, Principal of JP Brand Primary School, conveyed her sincere gratitude for the substantial donation, emphasising the positive impact it would have on the students. The provision of school uniforms was particularly highlighted for its role in fostering equality and instilling pride among the students.

Dr. Kärner, Exploration Manager of RMR, highlighted the significance of collaborating with community leaders and the commitment to supporting the educational development of the Topnaar students (refer Article 1).

Educational Needs of the Walvis Bay School Circuit

Ms. Goagoses, the Inspector of Education for the Walvis Bay Circuit, identified a need for textbooks for Grade 9 students at the new Narraville Secondary School which opened its doors in January 2024. Students had made use of photocopies prior to the date of the donation as orders had been placed but the delivery received from the relevant Ministry was delayed.

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RMR provided a projector and mobile screen and 21 textbooks for each subject, covering English, Geography, Physical Science, Life Science, Agricultural Science, History, Maths, Accounting, and Entrepreneurship. At the formal handover of the equipment and books to Narraville Secondary School, with a value of N\$42,070, Ms. Goagoses expressed her appreciation. "*The textbooks will enhance the learning experience, while the projector and screen will contribute to creating a more stimulating and inclusive learning environment, ultimately benefiting both students and teachers.*"

Erongo Career Fair

The Company participated in the seventh annual Career Fair for schools in Swakopmund as part of the annual roadshow by the Erongo Regional Council and Directorate of Education, Arts and Culture with the theme **"Thriving in 2024: Year of Expectations Career Fair Roadshow Awaits!".**

The Career Fair is generously supported by the Municipalities and Town Councils of Swakopmund, Walvis Bay, Karibib and Usakos, the Namibian Uranium Association, the Ministry of Labour, Industrial Relations and Employment Creation, and the Ministry of Sports, Youth and National Services. Approximately 3,000 Grade 11 and AS (Grade 12) students from various high schools within the region visited providing an excellent opportunity for businesses and training institutions to engage with this crucial group of near-future employees and students by introducing them to future career and study opportunities, including at RMR.

Exhibitors from educational institutions like the University of Namibia, the Namibian Institute of Mining and Technology, the International University of Management and Triumphant College, as well as various mining sector participants attended.



Mr. Shixungileni, Ms. Haikali and Ms. Mwatyonye (Geologists, RMR) informed visitors about the geology, environment, and safety aspects of the Company.

In addition, the organisers also invited the Namibia Students Financial Assistance Fund and the Ministry of Gender Equality, Poverty Eradication and Social Welfare, as well as private companies like the MTC Dome Academy, and the Namibia National Students Organisation, amongst others. The program included panel discussions on topics related to mental health and substance abuse by various professionals.

The primary aim of the Career Fair is to introduce and promote various career paths to students, highlighting both work and training opportunities. Many students have inquired about employment opportunities in the mining industry. Our Geology and Environment, Health and Safety Departments, represented by Mr. Shixungileni, Ms. Haikali, Ms. Mwatyonye and Mr. Kandjungu spoke about geology, environment, and safety aspects of the Company and what it meant to work in those areas.



Our impact in these communities is visible by the knowledge sharing as well as support for lunch packs provided for the first of the four-day event.

Skills Development Centre at NIMT

The Namibian Institute of Mining and Technology (NIMT) was established to prepare young Namibians for technical positions in the mining industry. It has since become a reputable training institution with three campuses spread across the country, whose graduates are equipped with the necessary practical skills for a career in mining and engineering.

The NIMT campus at Arandis, Erongo Region, received a bench grinder, pedestal drill, engineers' vices, and 10 mm black steel metal from RMR. This contribution allowed NIMT to launch a Skills Development Centre to upskill training aimed at enhancing training and refresher courses for institutions and the private sector.

NIMT recognises the importance of practical training in conjunction with theoretical knowledge. Their extensive experience and success in industry skills transfer have led to the exciting new venture of offering practical training workshops to companies via the Centre, with RMR being a vital part of this initiative.

Dr. Kärner emphasised the crucial role of NIMT as a National Technical and Vocational Education and Training centre. She highlighted its importance in addressing the skills gap in the job market and offering diverse career opportunities for lifelong learning and professional growth, which now extends to the industry. The donation, valued at N\$34,200, will provide students and companies with essential equipment for their training.

Mr. de Klerk, Principal of NIMT Building and Civil Trades Campus, expressed gratitude for the donation and recognised the positive impact it will have on skills development. He remarked, "We are grateful for the generous donation and the support from RMR. This equipment will enable us to improve the skills development of all stakeholders."

Mondesa Youth Opportunities

Mondesa Youth Opportunities (**MYO**), a registered Namibian non-profit trust, has been dedicated to providing after-school educational interventions for the past 20 years, operating solely on donations. This program serves students from underprivileged schools in the Erongo Region who demonstrate ability and promise, offering them an intensive after-school education program aimed at enhancing their opportunities for higher education. The program is free of charge, though it requires regular attendance from the students.

MYO specifically targets high-achieving students from disadvantaged socioeconomic backgrounds, fostering positive thinking and high self-esteem to cultivate a future generation of forward-thinking Namibian leaders. The curriculum at MYO includes subjects such as mathematics, English, reading, computer science, life skills, sports, and music lessons. RMR has maintained a longstanding partnership with MYO and is committed to continuing its support for this well-managed and sustainable organisation, which plays a crucial role in education. The Company, with the support of JOGMEC, invested N\$60,000 with the donation of a gas stove, maintenance of school containers (rust repair and re-painting) and repairs to a garage roof.

Empowering Communities Through Sport

This pillar of support is aimed at enhancing community participation, youth development, and early talent recognition in Namibia by supplying sports and training equipment.

Namibian Boxing Team

The Namibian National Olympic Committee sent a team of six boxers, two coaches, and a medical professional to the World Boxing Championships and Olympic Qualifier to Italy in March 2024. Notably, three of the six boxers hailed from the Erongo Region, underscoring the region's significant contribution to Namibia's boxing talent pool. RMR provided essential boxing equipment to Mr. Tsamaseb, head coach of the Erongo Boxing Federation, to empower Namibian boxers in their journey towards the 2024 Paris Olympic Games.

Mr. Tsamaseb, also the founder of the Albertus Tsamaseb Academy, was appointed as one of two National Coaches of the Namibian Boxing Team for the qualifying competitions mandated by the International Federations in tandem with the International Olympic Committee.

RMR donated a full body protector, leather skip ropes, head and face guards, gloves, and stop watches to National boxers. The boxers also shared their boxing experiences with RMR employees.

Mr. Tsamaseb expressed gratitude for the support provided by his employer RMR, emphasising the importance of utilising top-quality equipment during the intensive preparations for international championships. "I am grateful for the support from RMR," said Mr. Tsamaseb. "The new equipment enables us to protect our boxers and promotes fair play. Boxers are required to wear guards that meet specific standards, ensuring that each boxer has the same level of protection. This prevents any unfair advantages from superior gear. It also ensures that boxers follow the same rules and guidelines, promoting a fair and equal competition."

Dr. Kärner emphasised the significant role of boxing in promoting physical fitness, mental resilience, and national pride in Namibia. *"Our Company is committed to nurturing talent in sports,"* she stated, highlighting the extensive societal benefits that sporting activities provide.

GameChangers and Future Stars at the MTC Dome

The Future Stars Hockey and GameChangers programs, designed to nurture young talent and foster a passion for sports among underprivileged youth in Swakopmund, received sports equipment valued at N\$21,100. This contribution marks a significant step in supporting these initiatives aimed at empowering young athletes.

Hosted at the MTC Dome in Swakopmund, the Future Stars Hockey program is an exciting initiative catering to 20 boys and girls aged nine to ten from Swakopmund Primary School. These enthusiastic young athletes participate in bi-weekly training sessions that focus on developing essential hockey skills. From stick handling to understanding basic game strategies, the program emphasises not only physical abilities but also the importance of teamwork, discipline, and sportsmanship.

Since its inception, the program has seen remarkable progress among participants, who grow more confident and skilled with each session. The ultimate aim is to prepare these budding athletes for the K5 Indoor World Cup, scheduled for the first quarter of 2025 in Windhoek, Namibia's capital. This event will provide them with an opportunity to showcase their talents on a larger stage. In addition to hockey, RMR supports the GameChangers' netball program, engaging 21 girls from underprivileged backgrounds. Through the dedication of the GameChangers' team and their coaches, participants have experienced significant transformations. From learning essential life skills to fostering a sense of teamwork and respect, the program aims to equip these girls for success both on and off the court.



RMR has donated 20 indoor hockey sticks, 30 balls, and 22 t-shirts to Future Stars, along with two mobile netball posts to the GameChangers. Reflecting on the program's impact, Mr. van der Merwe, RMR SHER Manager, stated, "We believe that through sports, young individuals can not only hone their athletic abilities but also develop essential character traits invaluable for success in life. We are proud to support initiatives like Future Stars Hockey and GameChangers, which empower youth and contribute to their holistic development."

The newly constructed outdoor seating, adorned with the words "Respect, Compassion, and Humility," symbolises the core values upheld by NHS. These values are prominently displayed, reinforcing the principles that guide the students in both their academic and extracurricular activities.



The handover event was a memorable occasion filled with excitement and appreciation as the new sports clothing and seating area were unveiled. This initiative underscores the commitment to fostering community development and supporting educational institutions in Namibia.



Ms. September, Principal of NHS, expressed her heartfelt gratitude to RMR for their unwavering support, stating, "This donation significantly impacts our sports teams and the overall morale of our students. Our teams can participate at any level with pride. The new seating area is a constant reminder of the values we strive to instil in our students."

Protecting the Environment

RMR demonstrates a comprehensive approach to environmental protection, emphasising sustainability and the interconnection between communication, conservation, and community engagement. The efforts are centred around enhancing communication systems in remote areas, safeguarding vulture populations, and participating in a Biodiversity Week. This initiative represents the second-largest contribution of RMR's CSR activities for FY2024.

Ganab Station – Namib-Naukluft National Park

A donation to the value of N\$53,338 was made to improve communication infrastructures at the Ganab station in the Namib-Naukluft National Park (**NNNP**), ensuring that those working in isolated environments have access to reliable tools. This initiative supports sustainable operations and enhances efficient communication for day-to-day operations, enabling the remote office at Ganab to efficiently communicate and coordinate efforts. Ganab station deals with law enforcement, mining and prospecting inspections, water and fence installations and inspections, tourist control, human and wildlife conflict management, upgrading of tourists campsites, problem animal control and system implementation.

The improved communication system for upload and download capacity will provide capacity 12 times faster than the previous satellite-link service. This speed, combined with the lower latency compared to the satellite, means it should be adequate for video calls and generally improved internet performance. The installation of Airfiber (radio transmission), Customer Premises Equipment materials and a Fritzbox router and repeater should be completed end of August 2024.

Vultures Namibia

RMR has been supporting the vulture tracking program of Vultures Namibia for some years. The protection of vulture populations is emphasised as a crucial element in maintaining ecological balance. Vultures play a vital role in the ecosystem by preventing the spread of disease through the consumption of carcasses. Efforts include habitat preservation, reducing threats from poisoning, and increasing public awareness about their importance.

Vultures Namibia conduct aerial surveys to detect breeding birds in the NNNP, after which the GPS position of nests is plotted on maps. RMR donated N\$38,000 towards aviation gasoline in support of annual airborne surveys.





In November 2023, Mr. Kandjungu of RMR, was fortunate to be able to accompany the Vulture Namibia Team to perform tagging of juvenile vultures in the NNNP. The team was led by Mr. Bridgeford and Mr. Boorman (volunteers for Vultures Namibia) assisted by three additional team members.

Vultures' wings can spread to about two metres which is why they nest in the treetops as they are unable to squeeze in-between the branches. Once the branches grow over the nest, the birds will abandon the nest and build a new nest.

Mr. Kandjungu, who had the privilege to hold the bird (though he was a bit nervous), said "*It was an amazing, eye-opening experience.*"



Gobabeb-Namib Research Institute

RMR has reinforced its commitment to safety in remote areas with a generous donation of two Garmin inReach Mini 2 satellite communicators valued at N\$17,680 to enhance field safety for stakeholders, especially students, working in remote environments. The donation addresses the needs of the Gobabeb Namib Research Institute, a leading desert research centre located 90 km east of Walvis Bay. By recognising the challenges faced by individuals working or studying in isolated regions, RMR's initiative ensures access to reliable communication tools for those in the field.



The Garmin inReach Mini 2 communicators, equipped with the latest technology, allow users to send messages to cell phones, update social media, and share their precise locations. Most importantly, they feature an interactive SOS function that can be activated during emergencies, alerting a 24/7 emergency response coordination centre.

"Our donation of Garmin inReach Mini 2 satellite communicators highlights our dedication to the safety and well-being of individuals operating in remote environments," said Dr. Kärner. "We understand the importance of reliable communication in ensuring our stakeholders' safety, and we are proud to support the crucial work conducted by Gobabeb."

Biodiversity Week - Walvis Bay

Active participation in the Biodiversity Week, organised by the Municipality of Walvis Bay, underscores a commitment to promoting biodiversity and sustainability. Events and activities focused on educating communities about the importance of diverse ecosystems and encouraging actions that contribute to the preservation of various species and their habitats.

The Department of Water, Waste and Environmental Management of Walvis Bay Municipality organised a comprehensive program in celebrating their annual Biodiversity Week, encompassing various activities with the town's Eenvironmental Clubs and the Out-of-School Youth groups. The program catered for educational activities, poster colouring competitions, mini quizzes, a clean-up campaign, a bird watching event and beach sport events.

RMR played a significant role in promoting environmental awareness and education on World Environmental Day (5 June 2024) during a tree planting ceremony, hosted at Narraville Secondary School. RMR donated 30 trees, along with fertiliser and watering cans, to the school to enhance the school's green spaces and to provide practical learning experiences for students. RMR sponsored six winners of a poster competition. The total contribution of N\$23,120, included the supply of trees (N\$16,598) and sponsoring the winners (N\$6,521). Overall, the donation of educational resources not only addresses immediate needs but also has the potential to contribute to long-term improvements in educational quality and outcomes in the Erongo Region.

West Coast Safety Initiative

The West Coast Safety Initiative (**WCSI**), a non-profit organisation dependent on donations, is dedicated to enhancing road safety awareness and emergency preparedness throughout the Erongo Region. RMR has consistently played a vital role in supporting this mission by contributing to WCSI's annual road safety campaigns during critical holiday periods in April and December. These campaigns notably distributed 35,000 emergency packs to motorists visiting the Erongo Region.

The information packs were carefully curated to include essential items such as road safety guidelines, key regional emergency contact numbers, informative materials on maintenance, and details about the importance of seatbelt use and combating road fatigue.



Round Table - Winter Knights Fundraising

Winter Knights is an annual event organised by Round Table Namibia to collect money for blankets for underprivileged communities, helping them endure the harsh winter months. Companies have the opportunity to "buy street corners" to collect funds from 6:00am until 8:00am. Anybody can drive or walk up to them and donate money which Round Table then distribute to those in need. RMR bought a busy street corner this year. Seven of RMR's employees volunteered, underscoring the power of community and the importance of charitable efforts in making a tangible difference in the lives of those in need.

Deep Yellow Limited's Reptile Mineral Resources and Exploration on Monday donated textbooks and educational equipment to Narraville Secondary School at Walvis Bay.

Walvis Bay education inspector Ms. Goagoses identified the need for textbooks at the school, especially for Grade 9 pupils.


